Questions to Ask Before Enrolling

- Weekly time commitment for students & parents?
- Who provides or creates the curriculum?
- How are assessments and progress tracked?
- Flexibility for vacations or family events?
- Communication between families and teachers?
- Extracurricular or social opportunities?
- Technology requirements for virtual programs?
- Transition process in or out of the program?

Combine:

- Curriculum of your choice
- Local tutors, co-ops, or pod schools
- Hands-on learning kits or classes
- Arts, sports, or extracurriculars
- Flexible weekly plan tailored to your schedule

Many states allow custom mixes of learning formats if attendance and portfolio requirements are met.
