This simple guide walks you step-by-step to create a co-op that works for your family and others.

Goal: Build a co-op where kids learn, collaborate, and connect!

Step 1: Define Your Vision

Tip: Start small — one subject, one day a week, a few families.

- Action: Create a 1-page "About Our Co-op" with goals, values, and expectations.

📚 Step 3: Pick a Structure

- Role-Play Co-op: Storytelling & simulations
- Project-Based: Experiments, trips, presentations
- 💡 **Tip:** Mix formats as your co-op grows.

Step 4: Plan Interactive Activities

- Debates & discussion prompts
- Team-building projects (LEGO, Rube Goldberg, comics)
- 🔬 Science fairs, mini plays, group journaling
- Magame-based learning: Jeopardy, scavenger hunts, escape rooms
- **The Action:** Ensure every child leads, speaks, and contributes.

Step 5: Stay Organized & Flexible

- Shared Google Calendar
- Section Rotate responsibilities
- Adjust schedule & format as needed
- Reminder: Focus on community, not perfection.
